A.A. History March

March-May 1938 - Bill begins writing the book Alcoholics Anonymous. Works Publishing Inc. established to support writing and printing of

the book.

March 1940 - Mort J. came to LA from Denver; started custom of reading Chapter 5 Big Book at Cecil group.

March 1941 - Second printing of Big Book. The term "spiritual experience" was changed to "spiritual awakening" and "as the result of these steps" was changed to "as the result of those steps"

Appendix II Spiritual Experience was added.

March 1946- The March of Time documentary news film, began production with the cooperation of the New York Central Office.

March 1948 - Grapevine reports: She's Glad to Be Free!, by R. K., Muncie.

March 1951 - American Weekly publishes memorial article for Dr. Bob.

March 1, 1941 - Jack Alexander's Saturday Evening Post article published and membership jumped from 2,000 to 8,000 by years end.

March 3 1947 - Nell Wing started work at Alcoholic Foundation 415 Lexington Avenue.

March 4, 1891- Lois W is born.

March 5, 1945- Time Magazine reports Detroit radio broadcasts of AA members.

March 7, 1940 - Bill and Lois visited the Philadelphia AA group.

March 7, 1941 - Boston newspaper reported that any drunk who wanted to get well was more than welcome at the AA meeting at 115 Newbury St., at 8 p.m.

March 9, 1941 - Wichita Beacon reports AA member from NY who wants to form a group in Wichita.

March 10, 1944 - New York Intergroup was established.

March 11, 1949 - The Calix Society, an association of Roman Catholic alcoholics who are maintaining their sobriety through participation in Alcoholics Anonymous, was formed Minneapolis by five Catholic AA members.

March 11, 1951 - American Weekly article on Dr. Bob.

March 15, 1941 - 1st AA group formed in New Haven, Connecticut. Not reported in paper until Oct 1, 1941.

March 16, 1940 - Alcoholic Foundation & Works Publishing move to Newark to 30 Vesey St in lower Manhattan. First headquarters of our own.

March 18, 1951- Bob W., was elected 1st Delegate to represent Indiana at the General Service Conference.

March 18, 1973 – Anderson Herald report "The Silent Invader" 26th Anniversary in Anderson, IN.

March 20, 1948 – Chicago Herald report a three part series on "American Billion Dollar Problem for Industry Alcoholism".

March 20, 1995 - The New Yorker article "A.A. at the Crossroads".

March 21, 1881 - Anne R, Dr Bobs wife, is born.

March 21 1966 - Ebby dies.

March 22, 1951 - Dr William Duncan Silkworth dies at Towns Hospital.

March 22, 1984 - Clarence S, "Home Brewmeister", dies.

March 22, 1981 – Anderson Herald report on "UAW's Crisis Center"

March 25, 1898 - Jim B ("The Vicious Cycle") was born.

March 25, 2005 - Nancy O., Founder of AAHL dies.

March 29, 1943 - The Charleston Mail, WV, reported on Bill W's talk at St. John's Parish House.

March 31, 1947 - 1st AA group formed in London, England.

Three Fold Illness?

While we give Dr. Bob credit for his intense work with alcoholics, "The Prince of Twelve Steppers," we owe Bill a great debt for revealing a secret of successful Twelve Stepping.

In reading Bill's Story, we learn Bill understood how desperate his situation was. He was dying of malnutrition and was wishing for the end, but he got a call from his best friend and drinking buddy, Ebby, asking if he could come over for a visit. It had been some time since they had been together. Bill had heard Ebby had been committed for alcoholic insanity but he there he was. Bill bought two quarts of "Bathtub Gin" looking forward to getting caught up with what was going on in each other's life. Bill poured a drink and pushed it over to Ebby but Ebby refused it. Surprised, Bill asked, "What has gotten into you, Ebby?" Ebby replied, "I've got religion." Bill's thought was, "Poor ole Ebby has become a religious crackpot." I'm sure that had that been anyone but Ebby, Bill would have thrown the guy out. Bill was a hard-core agnostic, but Ebby's story gave Bill some hope. Bill listened and drank.

For the next couple of weeks, Bill's agony and drinking was greater than ever. On December 11, 1934, Bill realized he was beginning to experience Delirium Tremens. A short time previously, Dr. Silkworth had predicted Bill would die of a heart attack during DT's. In hopes Dr. Silkworth might be able to help him one more time, Bill went to Towns Hospital where he was given a shot of paraldehyde that knocked him out for a couple of days. On the third day, December 14, Bill called Ebby and asked him to go over what he was doing to live sober. Of course, Ebby came and reviewed what he had learned to do. After Ebby left, Bill, an agnostic, slipped to his knees and prayed, "If there is a God let Him show Himself." God did and Bill's life was changed from then on...

For the next few months, Bill floated on his spiritual intoxication. Almost daily, he would go to the Calvary Mission, Towns Hospital or any place he might find a drunk. He would tell them of his drinking and the miraculous Solution (his "Hot Flash") he had been blessed with; physical, mental and spiritual. His success in helping drunks was a total failure. After about four months, he told his wife, Lois, that he was going to quit wasting his time chasing drunks. He was going to get a job and make them a respectable couple again. She told him that for the first time in their seventeen years of marriage, he had been sober for four months and she loved having a sober husband. She encouraged him to keep on looking for drunks. That would make her happy.

Bill decided to visit Dr. Silkworth and report his efforts and failure. Dr. Silkworth listened and told Bill he was turning his prospects off with his talk of his "Hot Flash." He was getting the cart before the horse. The Dr. told Bill to give them the scientific facts of alcoholism; the allergy and the obsession. Render them hopeless! Then, maybe they would like to hear about how he found his spiritual experience. He said he would try it.

We know the first opportunity Bill had to try Dr. Silkworth's suggestion was after a failed business venture in Akron, OH. Bill knew from his previous experience that trying to help a serious drinker had been the only thing that had carried him this far. He didn't care who the hard drinker was. He just wanted the opportunity. His prospect happened to be a rectal surgeon. The Dr. agreed to meet this rummy from New York for 15 minutes and 15 minutes only. In that 15 minutes, Bill followed Dr. Silkworth's suggestion and here we are with a plan of not only survival but how to live a life that really counts.

Bill reports of another opportunity of focusing on the allergy and obsession only in Fred's story, A.A., pg 39. They told him what they knew of alcoholism, the allergy, and the obsession, and shut up. He didn't think he was an alcoholic. They said they didn't know if he was or not but if he had an alcoholic mind, he would drink again. A year later, he called Bill for help. He and one of his protégés went to see Fred. They asked him if he now thought he was an alcoholic. He said he was so, being a year later, they gave him a killer dose of alcoholism by telling their story one more time. When he then pleaded for help, they told him of the Solution they had found. First things first.

The Big Book instructs us to, "Get an idea of his behavior, his problems, his background, the seriousness of his condition, and his religious leanings" before we make our initial contact with a prospect.

What is more important, learning how our Founders approached a prospect which proved to be so successful or sharing our ideas and opinions thereby putting the life of an agnostic or atheistic alcoholic at risk? If we take a serious look at long term sobriety in our Fellowship, it is very obvious that we are failing the newcomers. As one of my dear friends said, "The way we treat newcomers today borders on slaughter." The "Three Fold" idea is but one piece of the problem.

April 1950 - Saturday Evening Post article "The Drunkard's Best Friend" by Jack Alexander.

April 1958 - The word "honest" dropped from AA Preamble, "an honest desire to stop drinking".

April 1966 - Change in ratio of trustees of the General Service Board; now two thirds (majority) are alcoholic.

April 1970 - G.S.O., moved to 468 Park Ave. South, NYC.

April 2003 - Experience, Strength and Hope : Stories From the First Three Editions of Alcoholics Anonymous, was published.

April 1, 1966 - Sister Ignatia died.

April 2, 1966 - Harry Tiebout, M.D., died.

April 3, 1941 - First AA meeting held in Florida.

April 3, 1960 - Fr. Ed Dowling, S.J., died. He was Bill W's "spiritual sponsor." (LOH 364)

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
